The Festival

Urban Photo Fest has evolved through a number of conversations, research initiatives and exhibitions involving a wide range of partners and contributors from the areas of visual arts, film and photography, education, urban research and the social sciences. Originally, the festival started out as a series of annual *Urban Encounters* symposia held at Tate Britain. Eventually, these symposia developed into a series of well-attended workshops, walks, exhibitions and portfolio reviews. People seemed to be enjoying these conversations, and noticeably, they kept coming back for more.

Last year, we decided to bring the various happenings together within a highly focused and immersive ten-day period, as so many people were traveling in for the events, sometimes from considerable distances. Last year's inaugural festival proved very popular, with both Tate Britain (keynote, Victor Burgin) and British Library (keynote, Gillian Rose) symposia fully booked (so if you plan to attend ticketed events, please book early).

This year, we are offering an expanded programme including a photographic competition in association with the Royal Photographic Society (RPS), a masterclass with international photographic artist Rut Blees Luxemburg, exhibitions with Photofusion, London Independent Photography and RPS, workshops, walks, interventions, and social events. Urban Photo Fest 2013 will focus on the theme of 'urban materialities', which is quite an ambiguous concept, and throughout the symposia and other festival events, we hope that a number of lively and stimulating encounters will take place around this topic.

So what's this festival about and who's it for? In short, it is an interdisciplinary space engaging with a variety of visual, theoretical and research practices, and it will be of interest to anyone with a desire to explore how the city might be thought of and viewed through multiple lenses - real, imagined and metaphorical.

About Seems So Long Ago, Nancy

The gallery or visitor assistant in a museum or art gallery is a fundamental piece of the institution's mise-en-scéne. Seems So Long Ago Nancy is the title of an experimental documentary that resulted from a visual, sensorial and ethnographic research at Tate Britain and Tate Modern. It focuses on the people who perform Visitor Assistance roles in these galleries and their subjective experience of place and time. The camera fluctuates between the subjects and the architectural post-modern and neoclassical spaces they occupy, small gestures choreographed in an elliptical narrative, in and outside the walls of the personal, architectural and social fabrics.

Biographical Note

Tatiana Macedo (b. 1981, Lisbon, Portugal) Lives and works in Lisbon and London. Studied at Central St. Martins College of Art (BA Fine Arts), the Faculty of Human and Social Sciences, New University of Lisbon (MA Visual Anthropology) the London College of Communication (BTEC Studio and Location Photography) and the Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation's Creation and Creativity Programme Advanced Photography Course, Lisbon (2005). She was artist in residence at the CAM - Modern Art Centre, Lisbon (2007). In 2012 Macedo premiered her first feature film - Seems So Long Ago, Nancy, an experimental documentary shot at Tate Modern and Tate Britain, London (2011). The film was screened in several Film Festivals and Art galleries in the UK, The Netherlands, Portugal, Spain, Macau, Argentina and Peru. A previous version of this film was screened in Amsterdam as part of the Stedelijk Museum Bureau Video Program Really Exotic? and a work in progress version was screened at Tate Britain (2012) together with a discussion with curator Paul Goodwin as part of the Late At Tate Program (2012). Recent solo exhibitions include Seems So Long Ago, Nancy at 4 Windmill St. Gallery, London and recent group exhibitions include Jaz Aqui, Na Pequena Praia Extrema, ZDB Art Centre, Lisbon (2013) and Visões do Desterro, Caixa Cultural do Rio de Janeiro, Brazil (2013).

Defining Urban Photography

Urban photography is an interdisciplinary field of visual practice concerned with the evocation and representation of urban spaces and the lives of those living, working and moving through such spaces. It takes many forms including architectural, landscape, portrait, street, object, performance, documentary, archaeological, design and fine-art photography; all attesting to the rich diversity of practices constituting an ongoing conversation about the nature of contemporary and historic visualisations of city spaces. As a field of intersecting practices, it is closely related to urban research and reflects many of the themes explored by sociologists, cultural theorists, artists, anthropologists, geographers, historians and writers concerned with the story of the city.

<u>Urban Encounters:</u> <u>Urban Materialities Symposium</u>

Focusing on the theme of Urban Materialities, this year's Urban Encounters symposium will highlight practices from a range of disciplines - including architecture, archaelogy, visual arts and geography - that engage with notions of thing-ness. The interdisciplinary contributions bring distinctive, yet overlapping concerns to the investigation, critical analysis and theorizing of materialities within the urban context. These can include geographies of security and surveillance, bodies, surfaces, everyday objects, or larger architectural forms.

Panels engage with these concepts and practices through the themes of Sensibilities, Objecthood, and Disappearances.

Visual Urbanism: Perceptions of the Material Landscape

How do material aspects of the urban landscape inform and inspire urban research? How can visual research methods enable urban researchers to investigate the city's immaterialities? How do images shape the way we view the material form of the city? Following the success of last year's event, researchers and practitioners from across the humanities and social sciences will come together to discuss contemporary concerns within visual urbanism in the second annual conference of the International Association of Visual Urbanists. An emphasis will be placed on innovative methods within current urban research relating to the arts, humanities and social sciences.

The conference will comprise presentations and panel discussions examining interdisciplinary approaches to investigating the materiality of the urban landscape. A keynote talk will be given by Professor Caroline Knowles (Goldsmiths, University of London). The event will include a short film festival showcasing work by artists and researchers exploring the urban landscape through moving images.

Masterclass with Rut Blees Luxemburg

About the Artist

Urban Photo Fest is pleased to announce this year's masterclass will be presented by the international photographic artist, Rut Blees Luxemburg. Rut's work focuses on the relationship between urban landscapes, often photographed at night, and the surfaces of everyday city spaces. Her images have a shimmering quality, rendering urban spaces, hitherto seen as possibly banal and uninteresting, as radiating with energy, light and a sense of the uncanny. Rut's work is particularly relevant to this year's festival theme of 'urban materialities'.

About the masterclass

Rut has extensive experience of image-making within the urban domain and after an initial presentation of her work, followed by a discussion about related theoretical and technical issues, participants will introduce their images focusing on wider debates around the concepts of urban materiality and landscape. Participants will be given a working brief based on this theme, and will then work on producing a number of images to bring back to the group for feedback and critique, and for individual feedback from Rut at the conclusion of the masterclass. There will be a public projection of the work made on the concluding day of the festival. All participants will receive a certificate of attendance upon successful completion, and there is a maximum of 14 places.

What you will need

You can work with either analogue or digital cameras for you assignment, and if you are planning to work with the former, you will need to identify a lab that can process your films and reference prints within a 1-3 hour period in order to have the images ready for the following day. If you are working digitally, the images will need to be edited and put into a PowerPoint format for next day feedback. The sessions involve walking around urban landscapes, so you are advised to bring appropriate clothing, water, light-meter, tripod, and shutter cable-release.

The Workshop: Led by Karl Grupe, this workshop will explore the method of communicating through the use of typology. Participants will be introduced to the abstract of typology, from its origins to contemporary use in photography and be given examples of how it is used effectively by image makers as a visual communication device. Participants will then have the opportunity to approach the urban environment through the typological lens in a practical photographic exercise designed to shift the way photographers "see" and perform under this context.

The Discussants Nick Scammell is fascinated by where the photograph meets the poem and where the image meets the object. Nick curates and exhibits regularly with Crossing Lines, contributes to fLIP Magazine and was a part of the London Villages Project. He is presently working on an experimental book project - entitled Significant Wreckage - as well as a long-term project on London's independent second-hand bookshops, Archipelagoes. Studying for a photographic MA at LCC, Nick's practice orbits memory and failure via the everyday city.

The Seminar: How can a relationship with the past exist in which memory functions as an archive process, allowing continual reconsideration, rather than as a form of entombment? Renée Green

A gathering of gatherings made over twenty years; an unfolding; a condensation (Freud) of tremendous fragments (Klee) - in this work, John Levett will respond to Green's question by way of Blanchot's proposal of a past to come, and in that spirit re-engineer, re-purpose and re-imagine his archive.

Mutations of connection and disconnection (Foster) are hoped for: new lines of interpretation, counter-archives within the archive. Gaps and absences will be taken as forms of evidence (Merewether) for this new prospective past (Demos) and the freedoms it may offer.

The archive always works against itself. Derrida Memory restores possibility to the past. Dimsdale

A Two Way Street: Theory into Practice, Practice into Theory

The Discussants: Hugh Look is Chair of London Independent Photography and founded LIP's Central London Group. His interest in the relationship between theory and practice in photography was stimulated by attending the Crossing Lines group and in conversation with other photographers, many of them members of LIP.

John Levett is a Visiting Research Fellow in the Centre for Urban & Community Research, Goldsmiths College. He is the convenor of both the Crossing Lines Group and the Greenwich Group of London Independent Photography and organizer of The London Villages Project.

The Seminar: This event is designed to stimulate and enlighten practising photographers about the value of theory to their practice, and to show that theory also evolves in response to the changing practice and (importantly) role of photography in societies, politics, the gallery; on screen and on the page. 'Theory' can seem distant and detached from the making of actual photographs but many have found that theory can both stimulate their work and invigorate their imagination.

We aim to explore the value of theory to photographers working within the urban sphere: theories of perception and 'seeing'; the role of photography, anthropology and ethnography; socio-political thinking; communications and aesthetics.

The session will consist of four presentations by practicing photographers whose work is both informed and sustained by an appreciation of 'theory' as it relates to their practice within the urban sphere. Open discussion will follow. Hugh Look & John Levett will chair the session & the panel will consist of: Professor Christopher Wainwright, Claire Levy, Judith Jones, Michael Rodgers.

Erection, edifice and eccentricity: an eclectic's tour of Chelsea

The Tutor: Del Barrett ARPS is a free-lance writer and lecturer, who is Chair of both the RPS Documentary & Visual Journalism Group and of the London region. Del is a regular contributor to Advanced Photography magazine. Her photography can be broadly described as contemporary urban documentary, covering a range of topics from Hyper-Reality in the High Street to Streetology on the Banks of the Danube. Having lived in Chelsea for 25 years, the area is one of her favourite photographic locations.

The Walk: Old Chelsea has been home to many artists and eccentric denizens over the years, as well as fictional characters including James Bond and George Smiley. The streets are bursting with eclectic mixes of architecture and idiosyncracy, not to mention blue plaques - Cheyne Walk allegedly has more blue plaques than any other street in the UK. With the help of anecdotes, local trivia and snippets of history, this guided walk will offer participants the chance to capture the unusual and the bizarre in the streets of Old Chelsea.

Two optional **assignments** will be offered:

1. Where did they live?

Armed with a set of clues, participants will be challenged to find and shoot the buildings where the famous and infamous once resided. There will be a small prize for the image that in the opinion of the judges is the most creative and aesthetically pleasing.

2. Furniture

Old Chelsea offers a wealth of architectural detail and street furniture – from the Victorian tiles of the Michelin Building to the assortment of drainhole covers in the back streets. Participants will be asked to produce a "Collection of Detail". All participants will have the chance to exhibit their work in the RPS London Space (The Cave in Greenwich).

The Tutor: Peter Coles is a photographer and freelancer journalist, writer and editor. The Walk: The walk follows the Greenway, a raised footpath tracing a waste water outfall, from Stratford in east London, to the Thames at Woolwich. The walk passes through varying landscapes, with allotments, a cemetery, mudflats, parks and housing, becoming increasingly industrial, with disused gasworks, docks and factories by the river. The main challenge is to record the ways in which "nature" and "urban" meet, whether harmoniously, or in conflict.

liminal, not peripheral: a walk

The Tutor: Peter Luck is a retired architect, presently a photographer and researcher into aspects of London history, particularly relating to industry and the Thames. He is a member of LIP, of the Crossing Lines group, the Port of London Study Group and of a foreshore recording and observation group in the Thames Discovery Programme.

The Walk: An area from Mark Lane in the west to Back Church Lane in the east changes its apparent character along its course: unquestionably City in the west, unquestionably Inner London in the east with no clear delineation between the two. No certainty either which, administratively or culturally, one is in whilst traversing the middle zones.

The area was closely associated with the down-river docks. East India Company warehouses stood until mid nineteenth century when demolition began for Fenchurch Street station and Lloyds Avenue development. Railway company warehouses grew beyond the city. Sugar-boilers departed. In 1885 the Cooperative Wholesale Society established its London headquarters on Leman Street. Bank office and computer complexes have replaced warehousing and are being replaced by up-market housing.

We begin in the City at Fenchurch Street station and wind eastwards through layers of urban history and present development, returning to Tower Gateway.

Photofusion Exhibition: The Surface of Self

In Partnership with Urban Photo Fest

The Surface of the Self is an exhibition that brings together artists Laura Cuch (Spain), Anastassios Kavassis (Greece) and Orly Zailer (Israel), whose work in contemporary photographic portraiture raises questions around human subjectivity and cultural identity. Laura and Anastassios work with analogue cameras – a Rolleiflex 6x6 Twin Lens and an antique wooden camera – two technological apparatus that mediate their ways of engaging with people and make the process of taking portraits a ritual. On the other hand, Orly has worked with a digital camera for both the video and stills parts of the project. She aims to distinguish between the periods in which different media were used to produce the old and new.

These portraiture projects are concerned with ritual. Such rituals have enabled Laura (*Sleepless*), Anastassios (*Athenians*) and Orly (*The Time Elapsed Between Two Frames*) to produce collections of images that invite the audience to reflect on broader social and cultural issues, by embodying difference and questioning cultural norms. The images address how people that barely sleep make sense of such a condition? What it means to be an Athenian today? How one's identity is affected by the physical resemblance to one's family antecedents? In short, they are concerned with the mutable self inscribed, in material terms, on the surface of bodily being.

Retrospeculations: Reconstructing a Past to Come

How can a relationship with the past exist in which memory functions as an archive process, allowing continual reconsideration, rather than as a form of entombment?

A gathering of gatherings made over twenty years; an unfolding; a condensation (Freud) of tremendous fragments (Klee) - in this work, John Levett will respond to Green's question by way of Blanchot's proposal of a past to come, and in that spirit re-engineer, re-purpose and re-imagine his archive.

Mutations of connection and disconnection (Foster) are hoped for: new lines of interpretation, counter-archives within the archive. Gaps and absences will be taken as forms of evidence (Merewether) for this new prospective past (Demos) and the freedoms it may offer.
